“The Gift of Surprises”

Nearly 40 years ago I was completing my first basic clinical pastoral education (CPE) unit being trained as a parish pastor, I was told always take to heart an ancient Jewish mystical saying, “Be prepared to be surprised.” Now, being prepared to be surprised in a hospital setting is not necessarily to always minister in a happy situation or joyful occasion. Quite the contrary, it often is the opposite. In various hospital settings throughout my ministerial career I have experienced the ordinary and the extraordinary surprises that life and death brings into this world. With each new surprise taking place there came a new way of preparation for the next surprise. This spiritual discipline of preparing for surprises is like being asked to prepare for the greatest surprise of all, seeing Jesus Christ.

This is what Advent is all about—experiencing the ultimate surprise of seeing God with us, Emmanuel (Matt. 1:23). As Christians, we are asked to prepare and make ready for the arrival of Jesus in our expectations of his physical second coming, and to prepare our hearts for his symbolic arrival in the manger in Bethlehem at Christmas time. Traditionally, our church has prepared our hearts and minds quite well to visualize Jesus by singing hymns like “O Come, O Come, Emmanuel”; the lighting of the four Advent candles of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love; the hanging of the Christmas greens in the sanctuary and decorating the Christmas trees. All of these ways and more have prepared us to see the living Christ in our midst.

I would like to invite you to experience another way of preparing yourself in seeing Jesus, the face of Christ, during Advent. I am reading how one spiritual author, Edward Hays, in his book, [A Pilgrim’s Almanac](#), asks his reader to cover their artwork depicting the face of Jesus Christ with a veil. “If we covered the face of Christ in our home and church art with a veil, we would be less tempted to “know” what Christ looks like. Advent is a season to look into every face—man, woman, black, brown, yellow, red, rich or poor—and ask ourselves, ‘Is this the face of Christ?’” (Hays, p. 187)

Thus, “Be prepared to be surprised.”

NOVEMBER:**

- Pastor Scott opened the meeting on Nov. 12th with prayer and followed with Session Education in Fellowship Hall.
- Session Education was on “A Monthly Series for Serving Faithfully”. The story of Zacchaeus and hospitality. “When we think about hospitality, we tend to focus on the party host. Don’t let your desire to practice hospitality create a burden for someone else. Hospitality is not about you. It is about how you can provide comfort, joy, and care for others.”
- All members present except Fern Britton, (excused) and Nancy Schriber. A quorum was present. Dawn Patrick, Financial Secretary and Pastor Kroener were also in attendance.
- Accepted agenda as presented with additional items as they may come forward.
- Minutes approved from October 8, 2019 Stated Session Meeting.
- Clerks report: Session books will be audited on November 26, 2019.
- Treasurer’s report was presented and explained by Treasurer, Tiffany Fortier. Treasurer’s report accepted as printed by Financial Secretary.
- General Fund Oct 2019 Building Fund
(\$4,014.28) Income \$ 480.00
Income \$16,873.24 Payment 341.00
Expense \$10,429.76
End Bal. \$ 2,429.50
- Memorial money from 2005-2016 was moved to General Fund – undesignated.
- Accepted Treasurers report with ending balance of \$2,429.50 after fund transfer.
- Letters to be sent to inactive members placing their names on the inactive list. If a member is no longer active we no longer pay per Capita to Presbytery. Per Capita for 2020 is \$29.00 per member. We will not be paying per capita to Presbytery until we receive from our members. Balance to be paid in July.
- To purchase a newer model copier with color mode. Color scanner \$229.00/month includes copies. This includes 500 copies for brochures free.

- Presbytery Women’s meeting November 19th at 1:00 p.m. in Fellowship Hall.
- Member Care -Thank you for sponsoring and preparing the Annual Congregational Meeting Breakfast.
- Men’s Group – Meeting November 14th with Family Game Night, November 16th, 7:00 – 9:00 p.m.
- Average church attendance for October was 64. (One week of attendance not recorded). Worship Committee discussed what type of church do we want to be – a “Rowboat Church or a Sailboat Church”?
- Emergency and Disaster Planning Committee (Training in Emergency Preparedness and Implementation of Plan for 2020).
- Church Dinner Committee – Ken Maurer was appointed Chairman of the Church Dinner Committee at the Annual Meeting. Introduction meeting for committee December 15, after church. Harvest Dinner profit of \$1,641.83 with \$164.19 going to Youth.
- Sanctuary Sound System – Is being updated and repaired.
- Repairs have been made to the church furnace. Yards have been prepared for winter. Air conditioners have been removed. Heat ducts to be cleaned in manse. There will no longer be any recycling.



CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICE:

We will celebrate the birth of Jesus, Tuesday, December 24, at 5:00 p.m., and 8:00 p.m. Come and join us at Taymouth Church for an hour of sharing the peace and the joy that is Christmas in the warm, inviting atmosphere of the sanctuary, beautifully decorated for the season. We will sing familiar Christmas carols, hear Scripture, celebrate Holy Communion, and listen to choral anthems. Also, as is tradition, we’ll conclude our services with the singing of “Silent Night” by candlelight. We hope you’ll come.



ADVENT WREATH

Advent, the liturgical season of preparation and expectant waiting for the celebration of Jesus’ birth, begins on December 1st. Again this year, we are lighting candles on our advent wreath during each Sunday morning worship service. Traditionally, advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, which represent the four weeks of Advent. Most often, three candles are purple and one is rose (pink). Often times, advent wreaths will also contain a fifth candle, which is white.

The purple candles in particular symbolize the hope, peace and love we find in Jesus Christ. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, the Sunday of rejoicing, on which we remember the joy we find in Christ. The white candle, representing Jesus, “God with us”, is lit on Christmas Eve and Day, as well as on the following two Sundays.

The progressive lighting of candles symbolizes the building expectation surrounding our Lord’s first coming into the world and the growing anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY REPORT YEAR END

2019: The end of the year is fast approaching and it is time to take a look at our church finances. First, I want to say "THANK YOU" to each and every one of you! Without your generous giving and support, we would not be able to say that we are on target with our budget needs. The contributions budget for the year is \$110,000.00 or \$9166.00 a month. As of November 17, the total contributions received was \$97,840. The amount left in the budget yet to receive before December 31 is \$12,160.00. We can do it!!! This is only \$2,027 needed per Sunday through the end of the year. Let us keep that deficit from growing and meet our budget this year!

Second, Per Capita is the cost of being a Presbyterian, and if each member pays the per capita amount above his/her regular giving, pressure on the church budget is reduced. The Per Capita amount for our church in 2019 was \$3,999.03. This amount is the reported membership of 139 persons at \$28.77 per person. The church is responsible to pay this amount even if we have not received all the monies for it. As of November 17, we have received \$2,859.87. All per capita giving for 2019 can still be made now until December 31 to help with this budget item.

Third, our staff and session members continue to review the financial situation and budget needs of our congregation. Many ideas, needs, and wants are taken into consideration. All of us need to come together and support the needs of our church. Please pray that we can all be good stewards of the many blessings the Lord has given us.

WHAT IS PER CAPITA? Fair question. Let's attempt to answer it.

PER CAPITA has been part of our funding history for over 150 years. When presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly meet, they are conducting the legislative and judicial business of the church and incur necessary expenses. There are also some necessary administrative expenses involved which enable these ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions to be performed. Historically, per capita has been used to fund these. Importantly, per capita funding enables governing councils to make decisions regarding distribution of mission dollars without itself being funded by those same dollars.

The whole church shares in these expenses since everyone who is a member shares in the benefits of this system of church government. Per capita provides for the financial participation of all local churches as part of a connectional and representative church, thus providing for unity and mutual responsibility within the church.

HOW IS PER CAPITA COMPUTED? The Per Capita Apportionment in the Presbytery of Lake Huron is based on a portion of certain salaries and expenses which are part of the operating expenses of the Presbytery.

Per Capita is the cost of being a Presbyterian, and if each member pays the per capita amount above his/her pledge or regular giving, pressure on the local budget is reduced.

Paying per capita is similar to: • contributing one's dish to a potluck meal • paying to be connected to the internet • paying for the benefit of utilities, such as electricity, gas, water • pitching in with others to pay for gasoline on a road trip

In order to keep presbytery's per capita rate from escalating the per capita portion of the budget is subsidized with a distribution from Presbytery's investments.

WHERE DO OUR PER CAPITA DOLLARS GO?

The amount that is set for per capita apportionment is a calculation based on the number of church members and the budget established annually by each governing body. At the presbytery level per capita pays for a number of items including: • the mortgage payment on the presbytery office • the office of the Stated Clerk including his salary and that of the Recording Clerk • salaries of the Financial Secretary, Treasurer and the Administrative Assistant • insurance coverage, legal counsel, annual audit • costs associated with operating the presbytery office • meeting costs for our standing unit.
